Due to language, this show is intended for adult audiences. America's premier comic playwright delighted audiences with this out-and-out funny offering. Four couples are at the townhouse of a deputy New York City mayor and his wife to celebrate their tenth wedding anniversary. The party never begins because the host has shot himself in the head (it's only a flesh wound) and his wife is missing. His lawyer's cover up gets progressively more difficult to sustain as the other guests arrive and nobody can remember who has been told what about whom. Doors slam and hilarity abounds as the couples get more and more crazed.

The play was first performed in 1988 at the Broadhurst Theatre in New York with Christine Baranski and Ron Leibman in but two of the wonderful roles in this rollicking comedy. The play was done in 1991 by the Guild and won state recognition as the top play of 1991-1992 Community Theater in Delaware per the *News Journal* and the *Delaware Arts Council*.

On Golden Pond

This is the love story of Ethel and Norman Thayer, who are returning to their summer home on Golden Pond for the forty-eighth year. He is a retired professor, nearing eighty, but still as tart-tongued, observant and eager for life as ever. Ethel, ten years younger, and the perfect foil for Norman, delights in all the small things that have enriched and continue to enrich their long life together. They are visited by their divorced, middle-aged daughter and her fiancé, who then go off to Europe, leaving his teenage son behind for the summer. The boy quickly becomes the "grandchild" the elderly couple have longed for, and as Norman revels in taking his ward fishing and thrusting good books at him, he also learns some lessons about modern teenage awareness – and slang – in return. In the end, as the summer wanes, so does their brief idyll, and in the final, deeply moving moments of the play, Norman and Ethel are brought even closer together by the incidence of a mild heart attack. Time, they know, is now against them, but the years have been good and, perhaps, another summer on Golden Pond still awaits.

Marvin's Room

The play follows Bessie, who, 20 years earlier, gave up everything to take care of her bed-ridden father, Marvin and her Aunt Ruth. When she discovers she has a terminal illness, she must re-unite with her estranged sister Lee. Sounds like a ten-hankie tear jerker? It's not. McPherson has injected in his dialogue a healthy dose of humor and light-hearted absurdity.
